
































CARYS LEWIS: WRITER, DIRECTOR AND ACTRESS


We all remember Carys, daughter of Calgary Welsh Society member Alun Lewis, when she performed 'Beyond the Pail' for the society many years ago! This play written by Carys captivated the audience and perhaps, heralded her current success and involvement in so many aspects of creativity.

The following information is taken from her website: *caryslewis.ca* Please visit it! Carys is a Welsh Canadian writer and director. Her recent directing credits include *The Jury: Murder Trial*, [Channel 4]; *Father Brown*, [BBC]; *Vandullz*, [BBC comedy];

Casualty [BBC]; and Hollyoaks [Channel 4].

Carys is developing her feature debut, *Blue Mother* with the support of <u>BFI network</u> and co-wrote the film *How Black Mothers Say I Love You* with writing partner Trey Anthony [Telefilm Canada and FFilm Cymru, Wales]. The team have adapted the story for TV under the title *How We Say I Love You* in development with <u>Chemically Altered Productions</u>, untitled entertainment and Clement Virgo's <u>Conquering Lion Pictures</u>. The writing duo are also developing a new half hour drama /comedy for CBC with Sienna Films [Sphere Media].

Carys was the filmmaker in residence at the <u>Welsh</u> <u>National Opera</u> where she created a trilogy of films: *Gram Girl, Alt* and *Fluorescence LFF '19*. She wrote and directed a BFI Network comedy, *Stuffed* which was



As an advocate for equal representation of women in front of and behind the camera, Carys is the founder of FEM SCRIPT LAB, a writing lab for female and non-binary screenwriters in Toronto, and has launched the sister branch of the lab in the UK.

She is currently part of the FILMONOMICS 8 Cohort and has been a Writer in Residence at Theatr Clwyd, selected for the 2019 BFI London Film Festival NETWORK cohort, the Screenskills Mentoring Program, BAFTA Mentorship and was part of BAFTA crew from 2018 to 2020.

Carys is a proud graduate of George Brown Theatre School. She splits her time between Canada and the UK.

THE HARP ANGEL....Elaine Westlake



Deborah is the resident harpist at the Fairmont Chateau Lake Louise and Fairmont Banff Springs Hotels. She is on the Faculty of the Banff Centre of the Arts.

She performs in concerts world-wide from small intimate settings to famous concert halls such as Carnegie Hall, N.Y. and Washington Centre D.C. She has performed for royalty, heads of state, movie starts and numerous fans.

Deborah has degrees in harp performance from the Royal Academy of Music and Trinity, UK, from Julliard and Eastman in New York and from the Banff Centre in Canada. She is especially proud of the years she spent training with Osian Ellis, the famous Welsh harpist, in England and Wales. It was under his tutelage that she received her Masters in Graduate studies in London, England.

She has over 25 years of experience, has Produced 5 best-selling CD's and teaches harp to 23 students world-wide; even through Zoom! Deborah is available for weddings, receptions as

LOST IN WALES....Phil and Barbara Morris

Barbara and I flew to the UK in January to attend my late brother's funeral. We flew from Calgary to Heathrow, then onto Manchester. The co-pilot on the Manchester flight announced that we would experience some heavy turbulence as we approached Manchester due to heavy winds – but not to worry the plane was built to withstand the wind! The cabin was silent the entire flight dreading what was to come. The flight was relatively calm except for some slight bumps as we neared Manchester – it seems we were lucky to land before the winds hit.

Luggage in hand we exited the airport in a heavy downpour, only to find ourselves waiting in the deluge for our bus to the car rental depot. Car secured we headed for Oswestry in what was now a light rain. All went well until we reached Ruabon, just past Wrexham. Here we found the A483 to Oswestry closed and only one unclear sign of the diversion route. Having only had 20 minutes of sleep my brain could not comprehend where we were and I was sure we were on the Llangollen road by Chirk. We tried several routes, always ending back at the Ruabon roundabout and the road closure.

We finally spotted a Tesco and pulled in for a rest stop and to ask directions. We were in Cefnmawr and the cashier explained that the by-pass, which crosses the River Dee and the Shropshire Union canal on a high viaduct was closed due to high winds. Our only choice was to travel to

Llangollen via Trevor, cross the bridge, through the town and back down the A5 to Chirk.

This sounded simple enough but all the other traffic was also taking this detour. We sat in heavy traffic from Trevor to Llangollen, then crawled down the high street. The delay was due to oncoming traffic from Chirk that weren't stopping at the traffic light (which is set back from the corner) meaning that the large lorries ahead of us couldn't negotiate the tight left turn. Finally the lorries cleared the intersection and we began to move at a quicker pace. The detour at Chirk was clearly marked and we reached Oswestry about 2 ½ hours after our expected arrival. Thankfully the wind was not as strong as it had been several days earlier and no damage to property was found.

WALES NEW SPEED LIMIT

If you are travelling to Wales this year be prepared for a slower journey than you are used to! There is now a 20 mile an hour speed limit in every town, village and built-up area (Just like the playground zones in Calgary) The new limits are being enforced by flashing signs reminding you of your speed and hidden speed cameras. This really slows down your progress. The trip from Oswestry to Aberystwyth now takes 20 - 30 minutes longer.

Supper was a simple meal of Oxo soup and bread Or toasted cheese on Hovis Before going off to bed.




CLECS

We invite you as Calgary Welsh Society members to apply for funding to attend!

The Welsh North American Association (www.nafow.org) proudly presents the annual North American Festival of Wales. The event includes musical performances, seminars, language instruction, tours, informal singing, Noson Lawen evenings, displays and demonstrations as well as an opening concert and a grand concert. Festival headquarters this year will be at the Westin, Pittsburgh. Room cost will be \$139 + taxes US\$ per night. Rooms can be reserved now and registration information is available at nafow.org.

Cwrs Cymraeg returns this summer with Cwrs y Pedwar Llyn, or The Four Lakes Course.

As before, there will be Welsh instruction in 6 levels, from beginner to expert, led by tutors from Wales and North America.

Classroom instruction will be supplemented by a pub quiz night, workshops and an optional trip to Taliesin, Frank Lloyd Wright's masterpiece.

Registration is now open on Eventbrite and further details can be found on *SpeakWelsh.org*.

Application Information and Process

To be eligible to apply you need to have been an active member [before Covid] of the Calgary Welsh Society for at least two (2) years. Applicants will NOT be eligible for funding in consecutive years. You may only apply for funding to attend either NAFOW or CWRS CYMRAEG every two years. ALL applicants for NAFOW must be paid up members of CWS as of this year, 2023. One family application will be granted per awards year if eligible. Depending on the number of applications received, the selection committee may select only one person per family. In any circumstances, no more than two people per family will qualify for assistance. All applicants over 18 years of age need to submit a separate application from other family members. Applications will be placed in order of merit by an impartial selection committee. Priority will be given to members who have not previously been approved for funding. The amount of funding for each successful applicant will be determined by AGLC. Reimbursement of costs up to the maximum amounts will be made on presentation of eligible receipts to the CWS treasurer after completion of the events, and upon submission of a detailed, written report of no less than 500 words about your experiences, including seminars attended, concerts, banquets and musical events.

The Calgary Welsh Society Executive hopes that members will take advantage of the opportunity to attend the North American Festival of Wales. We will be applying to the Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission to allow us to use casino funds to sponsor some members to attend these events as detailed above. Names of successful candidates will have to be included in our application to AGLC for funding, hence the need for the early submission of your applications. Funding from the CWS is dependent on approval by AGLC.

We hope to inform each candidate of the selection committee decision as soon as available. NB All successful candidates will be required to give a written account of their experience to the Calgary Welsh Society after their attendance at NAFOW or CWRS CYMRAEG.
